2011 is going to be a particularly busy year for the partners behind the €7.4m Sail West marine tourism project. Several of the approved sub-projects are now coming on stream including the programme of works for the installation of new yachting berths at Mallaig harbour in Western Scotland. Notably, the preliminary design stage at Bunagee Harbour near Culdaff will commence after the formal appointment of marine engineering consultants in March 2011.

This year will also witness the start of the joint partner consumer marketing campaign that will focus on the strategic development of marine tourism in the shared waters namely, the Atlantic, North Channel and Irish Sea. Likewise, a new project website will be available in the spring of 2011. The project is funded under the EU's INTERREG IVA Programme and managed by the Special EU Programmes Body.

with its 8km of countryside walks around the majestic Inch Lake.


#### Remarkable 'Oscar' story with a real Ballyshannon punch

This will come as a surprise to many Donegal residents who frequently visit Galway for shopping, weekend breaks and longer holidays.

The results were based on a variety of topics including law and order, economy and jobs, environment, schools, local services, sense of community and cost of living.

Donegal received over 3,500 ratings and had a score of 4.1 out of a possible 5.

## Glenswilly native secures world bridge title

A Donegal man has become first Irishman to claim a world title in the game of Bridge.Patrick McDevitt, a native of Glenswilly who now resides in Boston, was partnered with Rich De Martino from New England when they clinched the prestigious Hiron Trophy at the World Series of Bridge in Philadelphia.

McDevitt competed in the 35th International Bridge Congress in Donegal Town last November where he helped his team win the Congress Teams Championship.

"i only play the game as a hobby so I was delighted with the success in the world series," Patrick told the 'Donegal Democrat'. "To become the first Irishman to win it is a great honour."

Patrick represented the Irish senior team alongside Rex Anderson in the World Mind Sports Olympiad in Beijing and also competed in the European Championships in Ostende. "It was great to take part in the tournament in my home county and great to meet so many people there," said Patrick.

## MacGill Summer School webcast shortlisted in the National Government awards

During the last week of July 2010, Donegal County Council webcast live, for the first time, all the proceedings of the MacGill Summer School from Glenties, Co.Donegal. During that week, national media attention was focused on the rural village, and how the economic and political agenda was being debated. Webcasting live brought these extremely important debates to a wider national and international audience; a new online audience which participated in the debates via the webcast and other social networks. Donegal County Council realised that the webcast was an opportunity to promote Donegal as a county in terms of tourism, engagment and the ICT infrastructure agenda.

The success of this webcast has been recognised in the shortlisting of the webcast as a Best Local Government Application in the National eGovernment awards, to be held in Dublin Castle on March 25th 2011. ### Women Into Public Life (WIPL)

The first 'Going Public' leadership training programme has just been completed by 24 women in Derry/Londonderry and in Carndonagh, Co. Donegal. In Scotland women undertook'Yes We Can'training in the Argyll & Bute region. The courses which ran weekly over three months, gave participants opportunities to develop their leadership skills, learn about policy and political structures and involved trips to national parliaments. Similar courses of this nature will be rolled out during 2011 including a once-off 'community leaders' training programme which will be aimed at women who are already in a leadership position but want to further enhance their skills and move into key decision-making roles.

To mark the 100th anniversary of International Women's Day the Project published 750 diaries and events to celebrate the day on 8th March are currently being planned. In mid February, Project staff and committee members will visit their Scottish partner, Engender, in Edinburgh.

WIPL is a partnership between three women's organisations in Donegal (Second Chance Education Project for Women), Derry/Londonderry (Foyle Women's Information Network) and Scotland (Engender) and Donegal County Council. #### **SPACE**ial North West

The Special EU Programmes Body (SEUPB) has awarded Grant Aid of €518,035, under the Public Sector Collaboration Theme of the EU's INTERREG IVA Programme, to the North West Region Cross Border Group to carry out the SPACEial North West Project.

SPACEial North West stands for Spatial Planning and Collaborative Exchange of Information and Learning in the North West Region. This project aims to track changes in population patterns across different settlements in the North West Region Cross Border Area, over the 2000 – 2010 period, with a view to identifying underlying factors driving these changes and capturing comparable information that will assist with more evidence based spatial planning, policy making and service delivery for many years to come.

The project partners include the NWRCBG, Donegal County Council, Derry City Council, Limavady Borough Council, Magherafelt District Council and Strabane District Council.

The first meeting of the Project Steering Committee took place on the 21st February, 2011.

#### Announcement of Freshwater Pearl Mussel Measures Project

The 'Practical Implementation of Freshwater Pearl Mussel Measures' project was awarded €2.3 million under the European Union's INTERREG IVA Programme.

The project is a partnership with Northern Ireland Environment Agency and is scheduled forcompletion in March 2014. Donegal County Council as lead partner, has appointed a full time project.

The island of Ireland supports a major proportion of the Freshwater Pearl Mussel populations remaining in Europe. Virtually all of these populations are at unfavourable conservation status and evidence suggests that in recent decades juvenile mussels are failing to make it to adulthood. Unless measures are put in place to ensure successful breeding and survival of juveniles, the existing populations will become extinct as the adult mussels die off.

The project aims to provide plans for pearl mussel catchments, trial measures to protect mussel populations, and produce codes of practice of various sectors whose activities could impact on the mussels.


### Glenveagh is a "wonder of the west"

Glenveagh National Park has fought off competition from the likes of Slieve League and the Earagail Arts Festival to be voted as Donegal's representative in the "Seven Wonders of the West" competition. The "Seven Wonders of the West" competition was organised by the Western Development Commission (WDC) and seven wonders were chosen from the shortlist of 49 nominations. Donegal had seven nominations, including Glenveagh National Park, Barnsmore Gap, Slieve League, Dunfanaghy beach, Earagail Arts Festival, Nancy's Pub Ardara and the Sea Sessions Music Festival in Bundoran.

The nominations included areas of natural beauty, man-made objects, and experiences.

The competition featured nominations from Counties Donegal, Leitrim, Sligo, Mayo, Galway, Roscommon and Clare. There were over 1000 nominations and 1,800 public votes before the final Seven Wonders of the West list was completed.

The winners were Glenveagh National Park, the Cliffs of Moher, Dun Aengus on the Aran Islands, Glencar Waterfall, The Reek on Croagh Patrick, Strokestown House and Surfing in Strandhill.



#### World-Class €4 Million Plan For World Class Attraction



Donegal County Council formally launched the Sliabh Liag Strategic Development Plan which has received support under Failte Ireland's Tourism Capital Infrastructure Programme and the EU's INTERREG IVA Programme. The Sliabh Liag Development plan involves a unique cross-border, multiagency partnership with funding coming from a variety of sources.

An investment of  $\in$ 1.7 million (£1.5 million) through the INTERREG IVA Cross-border Programme has been approved. The INTERREG IVA Sliabh Liag-Gobbins project is a unique collaboration between Donegal County Council and Larne Borough Council, led by the North East Partnership.

The Sliabh League Strategic Development plan aims to capitalise on the 100,000 plus tourists who already visit Ireland's highest sea cliffs annually, through the implementation of a sustainable visitor management strategy.

Effective Offshore has developed a recruitment section to aid trainees to obtain work in the industry.

The centre houses a number of high-tech training suites and contains specially adapted pools and a range of specialised training equipment and ancillary services such as a helicopter simulator, boats and fire fighting area that allow it to mimic off-shore conditions on oil and gas rigs. A medical suite, which is presently being developed, will soon be in a position to provide specialist offshore medical certificates, which are also a mandatory requirement for employment offshore.

Speaking at the official opening in July 2010., the Tánaiste and Minister for Education and Skills, Mary Coughlan T.D. spoke of the progress made by the company since its establishment "Effective Offshore is an excellent example of how a small Irish company, with a rural base, can be a key player in a global market. # Official launch of NUI Galway Medical Academy at Letterkenny General Hospital

The official launch of the National University of Ireland Galway Medical Academy at Letterkenny General Hospital took place on Tuesday, 04 January 2011.

Letterkenny General Hospital (LGH) has been chosen as a step-out clinical site for the education of Medical Students from the National University of Ireland Galway (NUI Galway). From January 20 third year Medical Students will carry out one full year of their training at the hospital, studying the same curriculum as their classmates based on the campus of Galway University Hospitals (GUH). Both GUH and LGH will use Internet and video-conferencing facilities to facilitate linkages between the centres including multidisciplinary meetings, joint lectures, tutorials and discussion groups. In September, 40 Medical Students in their 4th and 5th (final year) years of training will be based at Letterkenny General Hospital.

The official opening of the academy was carried out by Professor Fidelma Dunne, Head of School of Medicine, NUI Galway as part of the Induction Day for the students. The event was attended by members of the Medical Academy, the medical students and multidisciplinary staff from the hospital.

The arrival of the students provides Letterkenny General Hospital with an opportunity to forge a permanent relationship with a University, which offers advantages for patient care due to the sharing of resources in the areas of research and education training.

Dr Brian Callaghan said, "This is a new and historic journey for the hospital which has been transformed into a University teaching hospital; the Medical Academy is a catalyst for future development of medical education in the hospital".

Hospital Manager, Sean Murphy paid tribute to all involved in the establishing this new Medical Academy in Letterkenny. Speaking at launch he noted, "The establishment of the NUI Galway Medical Academy is an historic development for Donegal and builds upon the excellent educational and clinical role of LGH already established in the areas of Post Graduate Medical; Nursing & Midwifery; and Allied Health Professional Education. 2011 will see planning commence for the building of a new Clinical Education & Research Facility on the LGH campus as part of the hospital's continuing evolution as a University Hospital in the North West".

## 2011 heralds new expansion plans for LYIT

The Tánaiste and Minister for Education & Skills, Mary Coughlan has announced funding for LYIT to purchase two separate portions of land in Letterkenny environs to allow for the future growth and expansion of the college.

LYIT has seen a steady increase in student numbers which now exceed 3,000, a 30% increase since 2008; this is projected to rise by 25% in 2014/15. "The need for additional lands has been a priority for the college for a number of years in order for us to achieve our strategic goals," said Paul Hannigan, President.

The additional land will enable LYIT to utilise the space for playing fields and off campus building to be used for 'stand-alone functions' not directly related to day-to-day timetabled educational activities.


Since 2007 the LYIT has won significant research projects in new technologies, opened CoLab (the new business innovation centre) and has incorporated the School of Tourism at Killybegs into the Institute; all of which offers further opportunities in the technology, research, food and hospitality sectors. LYIT has pioneered collaboration with the University of Ulster to share knowledge through the NW Gateway Strategic Alliance. The four academic schools at the LYIT – Business, Science, Engineering and Tourism - have almost 40 new programmes from entry level degrees to Postgraduate Masters and PhDs. In addition to normal programmes, LYIT has introduced specific labour activation initiatives for those who find themselves unemployed in the



current recession, including a new Wind Energy Technician course.

2011 has begun in a very positive way for LYIT; it looks like a busy year ahead as the Institute will celebrate its 40th anniversary in September. This announcement will allow LYIT to effectively plan and to continue to meet the requirements of national strategy, the needs of students, education and industry for the next 40 years.

The history of Derry port is now available on the website of Londonderry Port and Harbour Commissioners which also includes emigration history, photographs and stories (one for a sailing ship – McCorkell's Minnehaha – and the other of a steamship – Anchor Line's Caledonia). From 1866 to 1939 the Anchor Line's passenger service from Glasgow, via Derry, to New York was an integral part of Derry's emigration story, and from 1916 to 1939 the Anchor-Donaldson Line of Glasgow operated, via Derry, a passenger service to Canada.

Photographs of the quay dating from 1956, include: Canadian Navy in Derry in 1956; Bengazi, with timber load, also 1956; 'mothball fleet' at Lisahally in 1961; Scotch Boat Lairdsbank at quay in 1963; and sweep of the quays from Walker's Pillar in 1963.

#### **Laurentic Conference**

On Friday January 29th, the Ulster Newfoundland Initiative hosted its 5th Annual Wreath laying service for the 354 men who died on the SS Laurentic when she was sunk at the mouth of Lough Swilly on January 25 1917 while on route to Halifax, Canada. Of the 354 men that perished at that disaster, 34 were from Ireland and 21 from the province of Newfoundland, Canada

Services were held at the monument to the Laurentic at St Maura's Church of Ireland graveyard in Fahan and at St Marys Cemetery at Cockhill, Buncrana. Both services were cross community with the service being shared by Rev Sam Barton and Father Walsh.

Attending the service representing Canada was Canadian Ambassador to the Republic of Ireland Ambassador Loyola Hearn, Colonel Paul Rutherford (Canadian Armed Forces Liaison officer) Meghan Drover Representing the Government of Newfoundland and Labrador,

Representing the Island of Ireland was Deputy Mayor of Buncrana Michael Grant, Inishowen Friend's Of Messiness, The Royal Navy Association, the Royal British Legion, the RNLI, and community leaders and groups from both sides of the border

Three years ago in conjunction with the wreath laying service and the support of the Canadian Embassy, the Ulster Newfoundland Initiative started holding a Business Beyond Borders Seminar entitled the Laurentic Conference held in Buncrana, Co.Donegal


Using high speed internet connections they will host a real time 'hand over' seminar in February to the young animators from San Francisco.

#### **Gathering the Irish Diaspora**



Irish Gathering (www.irishgathering.ie) is a website that was launched last March to enable Irish families to connect across the internet by sourcing their Irish roots and building their Family tree. It is in fact a full online Family history archive for people to record all of their family history through photos, documents, dates of birth / death etc.

Irish Gathering has had 100,000 visitors to date and over 6,000,000 hits on the site since the launch in March 2010. One of the major objectives of Irish

Gathering is to work with bodies who are interested in welcoming back the diaspora to help tourism, etc.

The website also interfaces with the 1901 and 1911 census and holds a database of Irish townlands, baronies and parishes which we have mapped to the Ordinance Survey Maps (OSI) thereby allowing registered members to access their roots geographically as far back as the 1850s. It is intended to make Irish Gathering self-funding through the promotion of Irish goods through our e-commerce IrishGathering online shop and by the promotion of events that will attract the Irish Diaspora back to Ireland in 2011 and 2012 and beyond.

In a recent survey carried out by "Gathering the Irish Diaspora", Donegal was one of the most preferred destinations by its members who intend to return to Ireland over the next 18 months.

#### Kathy Mcgee **Burns:** Blazing Her Own Parade Route

On Sunday, March 13, when Kathy McGee Burns officially presides over the Philadelphia St. Patrick's Day Parade, as only the 2nd female president since its 1771 debut, she is going to have some very special guests marching with her.

The little girl who grew up in the Philly suburbs with no knowledge of her Irish roots is now the woman leading the parade. And joining her will be her McGee cousins from Donegal.



"I always had this draw to being Irish....wondering where was I from, where can I claim as my heritage. But my father, Timothy McGee, never talked about his family.

It wasn't until he was on his deathbed that McGee Burns was able to get a tiny clue from him about how to go about finding her family. He told her that all the relatives lived in Bridgeport: "Kathleen, every McGee in Bridgeport, Pennsylvania, is related to you."

"My country, the country of my ancestors, still wasn't free."

McGee Burns began her journey. And her first step was to get out the phonebook and look up every McGee in the Philadelphia suburb of Bridgeport. She sent a letter to each one of them. And she got the response she was looking for.

But from that inauspicious beginning, she went on to become the first female president of the Donegal Society. And she continued on her path to discover exactly where she came from.

The circle will be made complete on March 13th, when Hughie McGee, his brother Paul McGee and wife Noreen, and nephew Paul McCool and wife Roisin, join Kathy McGee Burns and her family, including her brother Hughie, in the St. Patrick's Day Parade.

"I represent a culmination of all their dreams, hopes and wishes. We are all going to be in that Church together. And I'll be saying 'thank you' to all my Donegal ancestors."

Kathy McGee Burns lives near Philadelphia with her husband Michael and her nine children. She is currently in the first year of her two year term as President of The Philadelphia St. Patrick's Day Parade.
