Shay Given has completed a €10mn transfer from Newcastle United to Manchester City. Given is widely acknowledged as the top goalkeeper in the English Premiership and was a star performer in Ireland's recent 2-1 win over Georgia in the World Cup Oualifier held in Croke Park, Man of the Match on that occasion was another Donegal man, Aidan McGeady of Glasgow Celtic. McGeady's second half display was the key factor in Irelands win. In other soccer news, Seamus Coleman from Killybegs has just been signed by Premiership Club Everton from Sligo Rovers.

Donegal claim Mc Kenna Cup

Former All-Ireland winner of 1992, and 1993 All-star John Joe Doherty got his inter county managerial career off to a winning start when his Donegal side claimed a first Dr Mc Kenna Cup in January. John Joe also has former team mates Tommy Ryan and Tony Boyle as mentors while Michael Mc Geehan has been drafted in as trainer.

Donegal defeated Queen's University Belfast after extra time by 2-12 to 0-11 in a hard fought encounter in Omagh. Extra time goals by David Walsh (Naomh Brid) and Ryan Bradley (Buncrana) saw Donegal claim a first Mc Kenna Cup win since 1991.

Apart from winning the competition, John Joe will be happy with the performances of some of the younger players used in the campaign, notably, Stephen Griffin (Naomh Naille), Charles Byrne (Malainn) and returning players to the fold Brendan Boyle (Ard an Ratha) and Michael Doherty (Na gCeithre Maistri). Donegal face a tough campaign in Division 1 this year ahead of a first round Ulster Championship clash with Antrim.

County Donegal aims to benefit from 2012 London Games

County Donegal is ideally suited to benefit from the advent of the London Olympic Games in 2012. As part of the ongoing efforts to promote Donegal as a premier sporting destination, a Donegal Olympic Response Team has been set up within the Community & Enterprise Division of Donegal County Council and this will provide a first point of contact for enquiries for prospective teams. In addition to this, the Council will be working closely with Donegal Sports Partnership and the Counties two Olympic and Paralympics Coaches in co-ordinating familiarization visits to the County.

Donegal County Council have produced a promotional brochure to profile Donegal's appeal in terms of accommodation, access, transport, culture training facilities, medical supports and broadband-telecommunication services. The brochure will be used as Donegal's calling card to over 400 National Olympic, National Paralympic Committees, and International Sports Federations throughout the world. The Donegal Person of the Year for 2008, Dr. Joe Mulholland, was announced on 20th January at a function in the Regency Hotel in Dublin. Joe is a native of Stranorlar and went on scholarship to the Finn College in Ballybofey. He trained as a teacher in Manchester and later studied at the University of London and the University of Nancy in France where he received a Doctorate specialising in English and French Medieval Literature. Joe Mulholland came back to work in RTE in 1970 and started the first TV current affairs programme -Today Tonight. He filled many roles in RTE including Director of news and Managing Director of Television. Joe has won several awards for producing documentaries including Lost At Sea on the sinking of the trawler, the Carraig Una off the Donegal coast. Dr. Mulholland retained a strong affiliation to his native Donegal and in 1980 along with a local committee founded the Patrick McGill Summer School in Glenties. Joe Mulholland is a renowned broadcaster and journalist in the international arena. He has been a contributor to the French newspaper, Le Monde, for over twenty years. In 2000 he was appointed Chairman of the Editorial Council of Radio Television Kosovo (RTK).



From Leaders to Exiles The Flight of the Earls Exhibition on Tour



In 2007 Donegal County Museum and County Archives Services in conjunction with Derry City Council Heritage and Museum Service curated a major exhibition entitled From Leaders to Exiles – The Flight of the Earls.

This exhibition has subsequently toured to a number of venues in Northern Ireland and has recently been on display in the Ulster American Folk Park in Omagh and the Irish Linen Centre in Lisburn. An exhibition booklet and activity trail for children accompanied the exhibition and replica objects and costumes were also on display. Over 40,000 people visited the Ulster American Folk Park during the exhibition including a visit from Gregory Campbell MP, MLA Minister for the Department of Culture, Arts and Leisure while 1,400 people visited the exhibition in the Irish Linen Centre.

Top Irishmen home were Eamonn Boland in ninth, Aaron MacHale in eleventh, Tim McNulty twelfth, and after an earlier major mishap, Shaun Gallagher has won Group N by coming home in thirteenth position. The result was Loeb's 48th career win and his second on the Irish round of the World Rally Championship, which he last won in 2007. A Short But Sweet History


"A Short but Sweet History" exhibition is currently on display until the end of March 2009 in the Donegal County Museum. The McKinney family founded the iconic Oatfield Sweet Factory.

William Mc Kinney had a great interest in confectionery and even imported unusual confectionery from the U.S. On the 15th August 1927 the first batch of pineapple drops came off the then production line – made in a copper pot on the open coke fire in a shed at the back of the shop.

The business grew rapidly and within 3 years a site for a factory was purchased in November 1929. Production began in August 1930 at the height of the Great Depression with 6 employees. Oatfield sweets are currently exported world-wide to over 80 countries such as the U.S.A., Canada, Iceland, Hong Kong, Singapore, Australia, Papua New Guinea, Malaysia, Nigeria, Kuwait, Bahrain, Cyprus, Greece, Sweden, France, Holland, Germany, Denmark and Norway and Tahiti. Today, the factory employs 52 people and produces up to 35 tonnes of sugar and chocolate confectionery each week.



International **Telecommunications Links - Project Kelvin**

A project establishing direct international telecommunications links from North America to the North West of Ireland, entitled Project Kelvin is currently at an advanced stage of development. A specific access cable connection to access existing Trans-Atlantic broadband connectivity will see substantially increased competition in the telecoms market for Northern Ireland and the Border Areas including Donegal. This will reduce the cost of international telecoms to the end user, increase resilience and reduce latency with North America and Europe.

It is envisaged that a new submarine cable and the associated terrestrial cable network will be complete and operational no later than Autumn 2009. The contract has been awarded to Hibernia Atlantic who will have responsibility for establishing and commissioning this open access network. A key advantage of the broadband product is that it will be comparable to the price for the same product in areas for example in Dublin, Manchester, or Glasgow with a commitment that the pricing mechanism will remain constant until 2018.

This project will see substantial development opportunities available for businesses establishing, locating or relocating to areas such as Donegal and with a need for access to affordable high capacity broadband facilities.

regard the County Development Board is actively
progressing ocean energy development.

Promoting renewables across all sectors is a priority action for the Council and a number of information days have been facilitated, including a micro-hydro technology and a community wind farm information day. Renewable energy will continue to be promoted and a business sector energy awareness programme will be rolled out to local businesses over the coming months.

Donegal County Council is keen to 'lead by example' and is currently undertaking a pilot project which will demonstrate how street lighting can be powered by renewable energy. These include installing solar lights, hybrid lights (solar & wind combined) and hydro powered street lighting, along with converting some existing lights to Light Emitting Diodes (LEDs), a form of low energy lighting which saves between 50% - 70% on energy consumption.

Focus on County Donegal VEC - Adult Education Service

County Donegal VEC's Adult Education Service (AES) continues to provide a wide range of programmes for adult learners in the county through its VTOS, Youthreach, Learning for Living, Back to Education, Self-Financing and Community Education Support programmes. In excess of 7500 adults took part in VEC adult courses in 2008 and a further 4321 people benefited from courses supported by the AES and delivered by community groups. Courses are provided in the AES's six Adult Education and Training Centres across the county and in approximately 40 community based locations, at times to suit participants. Key supports to learners are in the form of Adult Educational Guidance, childcare and transport costs. 2008 saw the completion of a €1million Crèche facility at Gortahork Adult Education & Training Centre which was a partnership project undertaken with local community groups and other statutory agencies. Adult students are offered the opportunity to avail of certification where possible and accreditation is awarded by FETAC. The AES is constantly monitoring the type and range of courses offered to the public: a significant area of development in 2008 was in the provision of family learning courses and workplace-located communications courses; other new courses included Intensive Tuition in Adult Basic Education (ITABE); expanded BTEI provision and SkillVEC. Many of the AES's courses are provided either free of charge or at a low cost to participants.

Partnership is an important component of providing an Adult Education Service in a county like Donegal. There is a realisation that to work in partnership is much more beneficial to the adult learner. There are continual liaisons with other local education providers and support agencies to improve the quality of provision. This is particularly relevant in providing an Adult Learner Guidance Service and there is active partnership between the VEC, Udáras na Gaeltachta and the Department of Social and Family Affairs.

Other key partnerships include Tuath (CDB/LYIT),the County Childcare Committee, the County Development Board, Mevagh Men's Educational Equality Initiative, FÁS High Support Programme and the Health Promotion Unit (HSE).

The Adult Learner Guidance Fair is an annual event organised by the AES which helps to promote learning opportunities for adults in the county and elsewhere. This year it attracted over 800 adults and in excess of 30 providers and support services from across the country.

Workforce Development Forum Update

In 2007, the Department for Employment and Learning in Northern Ireland through its Skills Expert Group established six Workforce Development Fora across Northern Ireland to improve collaboration between Industry and Commerce and the Post-Primary Education and Training Sectors. Uniquely in the North West both Governments agreed that the greater North West Region should be treated as a single unit for Workforce Development purposes.

The North West Workforce Development Forum therefore draws its membership from North & South of the Border including representatives of Private Sector Employers, Dept for Employment and Learning, Invest NI, FAS, IDA, Ilex, LYIT (Letterkenny Institute of Technology), North West Regional College, UU, Local Authorities and Chambers of Commerce.

The overall objective is to deepen links between the Private Sector and the Education and Training Sector, with the intention of enabling the Private Sector to better articulate current and future skills demand and better enabling the Education and Training Sector to meet that demand. The two principal areas of work of the Forum are therefore matching local demand and supply of skills on an ongoing basis and identifying emerging skills in the Region.

Donegal County Council Organise Major International Exhibition


Donegal County Council's Regional Cultural Centre in Letterkenny and Office of Public Work's Glebe Gallery in Churchill organised

The Ulster Heritage **DNA Project**

The goals of the Ulster Heritage DNA Project are to study the surnames, families, clans, of the people of Ulster and their descendants throughout the Diaspora and to allow Ulster descendants in the Diaspora to locate their kin still in Ulster and to reconnect with them. Making Irish-American History - "The Green Square Mile: Story of the Charlestown Irish"

The film, shot over eighteen months in Boston and Ireland, was premiered at the Boston Irish Film Festival in 2006, at Bunker Hill Community College in Charlestown, and at the Parish Hall in Clonmany, Donegal. It was, after all, the O'Dohertys and their kin who made the Town Irish. In the 1920s there were more than 213 households in the square mile with the surname Doherty.

A lot of filming was done in Derry and Inishowen. One reviewer called it, "the story of the Charlestown Irish that is the truest story of the Irish in America." It plays frequently on pub screens in and around Charlestown to enthusiastic patrons.
