An example is a joke I heard recently which goes; 'Donegal driving instructor asks the pupil: "What sign would you expect to see approaching a roundabout?" Pupil answers "Fresh dug pinks." Enough said.



There are so many qualities to the county, from the beautiful landscapes to the accents to the people themselves that's it's hard to summarise in words, but being given the Freedom of the County a few years ago was an immense honour for myself and my family. Unlike my father I never played Gaelic for the County but from the very first time I walked out for the Republic of Ireland Senior International squad in 1996 aged 19 to when I walked out in Croke Park on 14th October this year for the 100th time I have always thought of the people back home and hoped that they would be proud of one of their own wearing the badge and, on occasion, the armband.

I hope you all have a very happy and peaceful Christmas and 2010.



Michael Murphy is named 2009 Young Player Of The Year



Donegal had reason to cheer at the Vodafone GAA Football All-Star awards at which Michael Murphy picked up the GAA Young Footballer of the Year at the 2009.

Now in his third year of championship football, Murphy is emerging as one of the classiest finishers in the country. He burst onto the

senior scene in 2007, and in the same year the talented Glenswilly clubman was playing for his county at minor, under-21 and senior level. The 20-year-old forward from Glenswilly ended up second top-scorer in the entire championship with 0-36 in 2009, pipped only by Colm Cooper of Kerry's six frees on All-Ireland final day, which gave him a total of 1-34.

Murphy, a student at Dublin City University, is the first Donegal man ever to win the Young Player of the Year award, after the Glenswilly forward beat off the challenge of Aidan O'Shea from Mayo and Cork's Colm O'Neill.

Oireachtas Rince Uladh 2009 / Ulster Dancing Championships Letterkenny 2009



The Ulster Irish Dancing Championships took place in Letterkenny on the 12th November to 16th November 2009.

It is estimated that in excess of 8000 people attended the championships from all over Ulster and its bordering counties during the four-day event from 12th to 16th November 2009. Irish dancing is becoming more popular than ever before and it is a mecca showcase for those young people (3yrs – 21yrs) performing and competing in the traditional art of dancing and for the impassioned audience it attracts from all over the global Celtic community. The best Irish dancers from all over Ulster were competing for the qualifying places for the World Irish Dancing Championships to be held in Glasgow at Easter in 2010.

Letterkenny Town Council and Donegal County Council were the main funding bodies for the Ulster Dancing Championships 2009 in Letterkenny, with support also from Fáilte Ireland and Letterkenny Chamber of Commerce supported it.

Donegal Libraries - A Great Place to Learn

Donegal County Library is currently in partnership with FÁS in offering an exciting eLearning Project to adults across its library and Taobh Tíre network. The project has been running since mid October and offers a range of online courses, accessible in the library or from home, supported by a facilitator in participating libraries and Taobh Tíre Centres. 125 people have already signed up to courses and there are places still available.

13 libraries and 3 Taobh Tire locations across the county are taking part, offering training opportunities in the heart of the community.

Focus on - Telecommunications Project Kelvin - Telecommunications Transformation in Donegal



Project Kelvin is a 30 million cross-border venture between the Department of Communications Marine & Natural Resources, and the Northern Ireland Department of Enterprise Trade and Investment. The project is assisted by Interreg IVA Cross-Border funding from the European Union. The network is being constructed and will be managed by Hibernia Atlantic.

An optic fibre submarine telecommunications cable has been brought ashore at Portrush. Fibre links from Derry to Letterkenny and from Letterkenny to Strabane are currently under construction.

When complete communications between Donegal and North America as well as Europe can be routed directly without having to use congested external networks such as London thereby reducing trans-Atlantic data latency. With this link, international telecommunications costs in Donegal will be more competitive than major cities and will certainly increase competition in the international telecommunications market.

Amongst the benefits will be faster response times at lower cost for high capacity broadband. As part of the contract connection prices as well as quality of service will be benchmarked against other international telecoms hubs such as Amsterdam and London until 2018.

The transatlantic connection will link directly with the Donegal County Council Metropolitan Area Network (MAN) in Letter-kenny and potentially with all seven MAN's in the County over time. This will position Donegal as an attractive, competitive and technically advanced region for companies seeking high speed, affordable international telecommunications coupled with the benefits of lower setup costs to those in major cities. The Letter-kenny link is scheduled for completion in March 2010.

Wind Energy - Donegal Gold



As part of the Governments Labour Market Activation initiative, the HEA granted LYIT approval to run a Higher Certificate in Engineering – Wind Energy. This September, 16 candidates enrolled in this part-time programme. It was designed to re-skill and up-skill those who were caught by the downturn in the economy and to provide the learners with new skills to enable them find future employment. There was great interest in the programme from all corners of the county and further afield.

Wind Turbine in the Donegal Skies at Meentycat, Drumkeen, Co Donegal

Currently, Donegal has over 200 MW of installed capacity. This is the largest concentration of wind power generation of any county on the Island of Ireland. The strategic goal for the region is to have some 500 MW of installed capacity. The Irish Wind Energy Association (IWEA) estimates that there are some 1.5 jobs per installed MW. This equates to over 10,000 jobs.

Wind turbines are Donegal's Gold, they provide a rich harvest of natural energy to heat our homes and supply our industry with power. To support the growth in this industry and keep Co Donegal at the forefront of this energy policy, LYIT in conjunction with Donegal County Council, the County Development Board and the other state agencies are cooperating and working together to make Donegal "The Wind Capital of Ireland".

Tánaiste Mary Coughlan said that the subject of the conference was very close to our hearts in Ireland, emphasizing, "... in Donegal where history and the complicated politics of our island transformed our county border into a demarcation of jurisdiction."

Paul Hannigan, President of LYIT, speaking about the importance of hosting the conference in Ireland said, "It is gratifying that we're now in a position to reflect and pass on what we've learned in Ireland. This is the 'new reality' in this part of the world, one of collaboration to work together for the good of societies, North and South. The delegates can see firsthand what has been achieved here. Once again we're pleased to work closely with the University of Ulster to bring such a prestigious and worthwhile event to the North West."


