

That was the family trade. I come so from a line of expert craftsmen, a fact of which I am very proud and never forget when I am writing. The shape is the substance, and the substance is the shape.

The Fort of the Foreigner is how Dun na nGall translates. A place as lonely as it is welcoming, as strange as it is familiar, as wild as it is peaceful – a place of infinite, inviting contradictions.

I return often to my home town. My brother Shane and myself bought a house some years ago there to share when we go back to the county. My niece Selena loves Donegal as we do. Maybe even more so. Our great sorrow is that our father and mother did not live to see her, but we know how they would approve of her getting to know the shores and streets, the braes and lanes of Buncrana. Being a natural actress, she can even do a super imitation of the accent, I'm glad to say, and



I hope that will stand her in good stead.

Coming from Donegal has also long stood me in good stead. The place haunts all I write. Even in the versions of European plays I write, I have felt it's presence in the snows of Norway, the passionate heat of Greece, the wilds of Spain and Russia, all transforming themselves into the inexhaustible landscapes and languages of my home territory. There is no escaping its influence. The Fort of the Foreigner is how Dun na nGall translates. A place as lonely as it is welcoming, as strange as it is familiar, as wild as it is peaceful – a place of infinite, inviting contradictions. Come to it, for it is uniquely, marvellously, utterly itself and nowhere else. This will never change. There are many reasons to love Donegal. That is the best.



LYIT to be a National Wind Academy - Killybegs

Letterkenny Institute of Technology (LYIT) is the first college in Ireland to offer a Wind Energy Technician programme with BZEE accreditation. This is part of a collaborative approach to establish a national Centre for Renewable Energy (Wind Energy) Innovation and Learning in Donegal. Currently Fás in the North West and Donegal VEC offer programmes in renewable technologies such as Biomass, Photo-Voltaic and Geothermal Heat Pump systems. This is in line with the integrated thinking in the county to establish the county as a lead player in the Green Economy. The Renewable Energy and Training Consortium, comprising members from LYIT, Donegal County Council, FÁS, Údarás na Gaeltachta and Donegal VEC – collectively known as the Education and Training Consortium for Renewable Technology, are actively working to make this a reality.

A National Wind Academy at LYIT moves one step closer as the institute invests in large scale wind turbine equipment for education and training. The 250kW turbines (See figure 1), control equipment and matching rotor blades will be located in a 500m2 workshop close to the Killybegs Campus (School of Tourism) of LYIT. A wind turbine training tower will be installed on the campus to provide training for both students and industry personnel. This will be the first such facility in Ireland.

There are currently 32 students studying Wind Energy Technology at LYIT and they will spend 1-2 days per week in Killybegs at these new facilities to give them the necessary knowledge and skills to re-enter the workforce and contribute the development of the green economy here in Donegal. Acadamh na hOllscolaíochta Gaeilge-NUIG's Outreach Centre in Gaoth Dobhair

The Donegal Gaeltacht is renowned for many things: stunning scenery, friendly people and the proverbial 'ceol, caint agus craic'! Not everyone knows, however, that 'Gleanntáin Ghlas' Ghaoth Dobhair' are now home to an outreach centre of the National University of Ireland, Galway.

Acadamh na hOllscolaíochta Gaeilge is located 'ar an Screabán' in Páirc Ghnó Ghaoth Dobhair. It was officially opened by the former Minister of Community, Rural and Gaelacht Affairs, Éamon Ó Cuív TD, in September 2005. Since then the outreach centre has gone from strength to strength.

Éamonn Mac Niallais, Administrator of the centre, described the progress made to date:

"We started off offering certificate and diploma courses on a parttime basis. We now run several full-time diploma courses as well as an innovative four year BA Honours degree programme that we deliver in conjunction with LYIT."

Education, training and upskilling have become increasingly important in the wake of the economic downturn. By giving the people of the Donegal Gaeltacht the opportunity to avail of third level courses at home, the National University of Ireland, Galway is playing a key role in community development in one of Ireland's most remote areas.

All of Acadamh's services are delivered 'as Gaeilge'. The centre is often referred to as an example of best practice on the thorny issue of how best to maintain and promote the Irish language in the Gaeltacht and further afield.

Innovative Restaurant and Professional Cookery Programmes at the School of Tourism (LYIT)

The School of Tourism at Letterkenny Institute of Technology continues to offer innovative training and education programmes for the hospitality and tourism industry. September 2010 saw the third group of students start the Advanced Certificate in Professional Cookery – Total Immersion Chef Programme (TICP) and the first group of students join the recently launched Diploma in Restaurant Operations Management Programme (ROM). Both of the programmes have been designed with Fáilte Ireland and are basedon the earn and learn model. Learners attend College in Killybegs for three days per week, during one academic year, while maintaining employment in the hospitality industry.

The nine-month TICP programme (FETAC – Level 6) was designed in partnership with the renowned French Culinary Institute in New York and Fáilte Ireland. This course will help accelerate participants careers and fast-track them into the dynamic world of professional cookery. The Diploma in Restaurant Operations Management (ROM) (HETAC – Level 7) is an innovative new programme which also integrates theory with practice. It has been developed to provide a relevant professional qualification for those who wish to embark on a career in Restaurant Management. In establishing this new programme the School of Tourism (LYIT) consulted and worked closely with the Restaurant industry, the Restaurant Association of Ireland (RAI) and the Irish Hotels Federation (IHF). The course will provide a stepping stone to a range of career opportunities within the restaurant industry.

The teaching environment at the School of Tourism provides personal attention, instant feedback while allowing a fully hands-on experience. This 'hands-on education' incorporates both theoretical and practical elements of working in a professional kitchen/restaurant. The TICP programme is aimed at people already working in the industry and who are interested in a career as a professional chef and individuals with a passion for food. The ROM programme is aimed at both existing restaurant supervisors/managers and career changers. Laurentic Gun On Downings Pier

A recovered gun from the first world was liner "The Laurentic" has become the centrepiece of a maritime monument on Downings Pier.

After many years preparation, the local dive group "Downings Divers" managed to recover a historic artillery piece from the wreck of the liner The Laurentic, which sunk off Malin Head in 1917. The historic gun, seven metres long and weighing 10.2 tonnes completed the final leg of it's journey into Downings Pier in September, 2007.

On the night of the 25th January, 1917 the Laurentic was rounding Melmore Head on route from Liverpool to Nova Scotia carrying over £5m worth of gold bullion when she struck two German mines. The ship sank within 45 minutes with the loss of 354 people. Three hundred and sixty eight passengers and crew were saved. The bodies that were recovered are buried in the Church of Ireland cemetery in Fanad.

The salvaged Laurentic gun has undergone a comprehensive conservation and maintenance programme and with assistance from Donegal County Council's Tourism Fund Downings Divers have developed a maritime monument with the retrieved Laurentic gun as it's centrepiece and the monument was officially unveiled by Cllr Noel McBride on Easter Monday 2010.

As part of the Earagail Arts Festival 2010 the children of Carndonagh and surrounding areas were treated to an afternoon of stories in the Storytelling Caravan with master raconteur Melissa Baker. Making Shapes¹ Public Art for Donegal 2006 – 2010 seeks to develop a program of Public Art Residencies, utilising both socially engaged & artist led models of good practice, which will take place in the context of the Council's overall cultural provision. **Imaging Donegal** forms part of the Residency Strand of the Public Art Program. Five Photography Artist have been commissioned, one artist to work in each of the five electoral areas of Donegal.

The specific objective of **Imaging Donegal** is for the commissioned artist to actively research and engage with a particular aspect of a specific electoral area (and its character) in order to create a significant body of photographic work that reflects and captures local images and realities. A selection from the work of all the Imaging Donegal photographers was exhibited at the Regional Cultural Centre as part of the Earagail Arts Festival 2010 and an exhibition by each photographer is taking place in their respective electoral area between September – November 2010.

Rich Heritage on Donegal's Islands

The islands of Donegal have an incredible stock of traditional buildings says Ireland's first ever Traditional Buildings Officer. In the second year of his two year appointment, Gerard Skehan has recorded and documented a uniquely rich vernacular heritage off the coast of Donegal.

Gerard, a Clare native, spent a lot of his time working on the offshore islands of Donegal." I have been very fortunate to have visited some of the county's least known, but possibly most beautiful locations; islands like Inis Caorach, Inis Fraoigh, Gabhla and Inis Bó Fhinne. They are stunning, not only for their traditional buildings, but they are all blessed with spectacular scenery and wild coastal views."

He continued "Donegal County Council, in conjunction with Udaras na Gaeltachta, has set a precedent by appointing a Traditional Buildings Officer. From my survey work it is clear that that the traditional buildings of Donegal's islands are a real asset, and have great potential for sensitive

The Altan Residency 2010

Altan, have recently undertaking a unique secondary school educational residency in the Glenties electoral area over the period from February to July 2010. The project is organised by the Regional Cultural Centre Letterkenny in partnership with the Donegal County Council Public Art Office and funded through Per Cent For Art.

The residency coincides with the group's 25th anniversary year. 2010 has been a particularly successful year to date for Mairéad Ní Mhaonaigh who has been nominated in the 'Best Folk / Traditional' category of the Meteor Awards, Ireland's definitive music industry awards and has received the considerable distinction of being chosen the Donegal Person of the Year.

Altan gave talks and performances in all seven secondary schools in the area – Falcarragh, Gaoth Dohhair, Dungloe, Glenties, Ballinamore, Arainn Mhor and Tory. They also gave a series of Master Classes. Participating students joined Altan in a magical concert during this year's Earagail Arts Festival in July. The concert featured the VEC Donegal Youth Orchestra who performed a number of orchestrated pieces of Altan's music.

Art and Climate Change

Donegal County Council Public Art Office/Regional Cultural Centre in partnership with Leonardo/Olats has established a unique and ambitious initiative entitled 'Lovely Weather' Art and Climate Change which fundamentally seeks to determine and present the role artists have to play in the Climate Change debate. Following an international competition five artists/scientists were selected to explore on the ground, the effects of climate change and its modifications throughout the county.

The five selected artists are Peter d'Agostino (USA), Seema Goel (Can), The League of Imaginary Scientists (USA), Anthony Lyons (UK) and SoftDay (Ire). The Lovely Weather Projects have taken an interdisciplinary approach and have actively involved both local people and scientists.

The first of the Lovely Weather projects will was presented on the 16th October when Softday (Ire) presented the world premiere of their work 'Marbh Chrios (Dead Zone), a live performance of a unique multimedia sound art work in Killybegs.

The Lovely Weather Art and Climate Change Exhibition conference will take place at the Regional Cultural Centre, Letterkenny, 12th - 13th November 2010, the exhibition will continue until 22nd January 2011.
